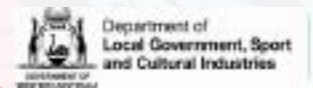

EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

Once again, how quickly a year comes around, so much has happened since writing my report last year. I started off my report last year with COVID, now over 18 months on since our first lockdown, I have to say it again – How lucky are we to live in WA”.

Unfortunately, many national championships were cancelled due to COVID. Our Club's have done remarkably well; our disciplines continue to run their events, often with double the work because of having to postpone because of a snap lockdown. Paddle WA has not had to cancel any of our events, which has not been the case for our state counterparts. However, as we call ourselves the “paddling community”, I feel deeply for our other States who have struggled during this time with many lockdowns, event cancellations and very trying circumstances.

MEMBERSHIP

Even going through COVID, our membership has stayed constant, which has been a credit to the Clubs by continuing to engage with their members.

Fortunately, Paddle WA was in a good position to offer a 25% discount to our members during 2020. In partnership with Paddle Australia and the other states, we provided for new and renewing members who had been impacted financially by COVID to utilise the Paddle On Foundation, which allowed these members free membership to clubs.

Paddle WA gained a new Club this year. We were thrilled that the Hurricanes Club in East Fremantle is now affiliated with PWA; this is an outrigger and dragon boat Club that have been supporting our events for several years now.

DISCIPLINES

Between all the disciplines, they run approximately forty-seven (47) events over 12 months which are well supported by all PWA members and the wider

paddling community, which were all run under the Livelighter banner.

PADDLE ACADEMY

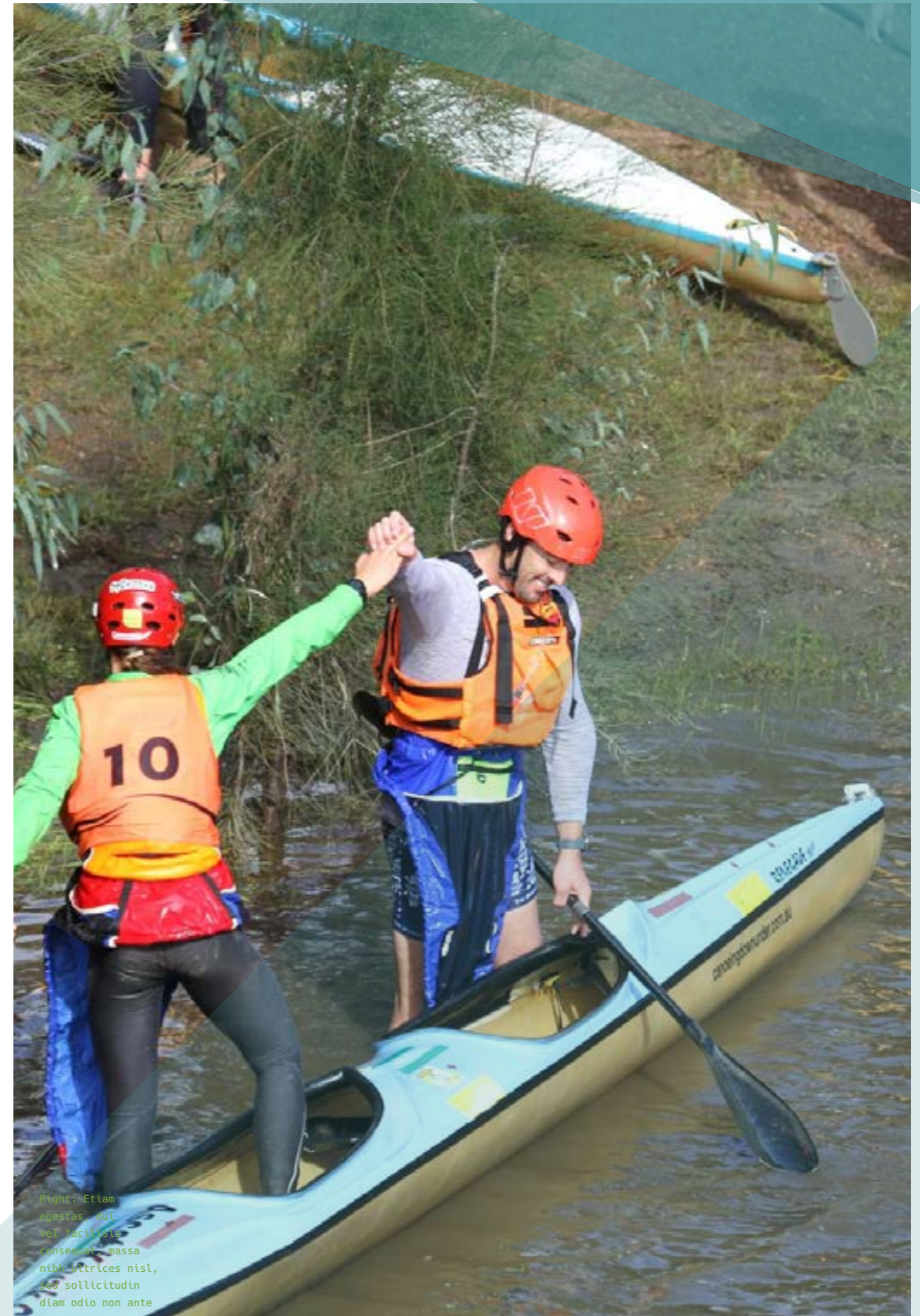
We had the best financial year ever with our Paddle Academy, and for the months from March to June 2020, we were unable to run any sessions because of COVID.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The past year we have been fortunate to have avoided most of the interference of severe Covid lockdown at a state level.

The Board

Together with Paddle Australia, the Board has worked behind the scenes to implement systems that smooth our working relationship with PA.

Our Strategic and Operational planning has followed a national model but with a lot of local-based input to address our local requirements. Paddle Australia and by requirement, its state bodies have been compelled by federal legislation and funding bodies' requirements to develop strong policies and procedures regarding certain aspects. In WA, due to state government sporting department drive, we were well ahead of the rest of the country. It has taken some time to shape the inputs from the state govt level into alignment with those coming down from PA. We are starting to see the benefits of this streamlining and as well as the solid foundations of PA policy structure.

Paddle Australia

Both nationally and within the State, I can see greater attention now being directed to operational aspects of the organisation in the years ahead. I have a lot of faith in the quality leadership and direction of the PA CEO Phil Jones and the PA Board lead by Andrea McQuitty. The "One Paddling Community" theme is important, both at a state and national level. It is pleasing to see a greater mixing between the disciplines of many paddlers. PWA looks forward to working with Lucy Warhurst, the new Sport Operations Manager, who some may remember from her time in WA.

Looking forward to the forthcoming year, the Australian Masters Games, due to be held in Perth in Oct 2021 with three paddling events - Marathon, Sprint and Ocean Racing, has been postponed till April due to Covid. The National

and the National Ocean Racing Champs in 2022 are still due to go ahead in Perth at this stage. These are great events to be involved with, especially since interstate travel is not required. In addition, on the back of having good rainfall in the winter, there has been some excellent downriver racing in the lead up to the Avon - a promise fulfilled by PWA based on the requests of last year's paddling forum.

Local Developments

The planning, provision of funds and completion of the State Slalom Centre at Ascot within the previous 12 months is a great credit to Sue McDougall (AKC Vice President), the slalom discipline and Ascot Kayak Club. Some initial setbacks were alleviated by local state government member support and are a great example of a dedicated group putting their efforts and funds together with those from the state government to develop an excellent facility for PWA members and the paddling community in general.

Likewise, further rapid and astute use of funding procured by Rosalie greatly assisted the early support of the Southwest Group under Beau Lewis, which has now led to the creation of the Geographe Bay Paddlers Club based in Busselton. We also have the Hurricanes Club (an outrigger and dragon boat club) join PWA. These paddling groups have added increased numbers and much colour to our events, and their inclusion is an expansion of the "One Paddling Community" ethos.

The disciplines under their leadership teams have continued to provide events for all members. However, these groups constantly require volunteer input to get these events off the ground, and I would ask each member for some self-reflection - "did I volunteer twice this year"?



High Performance

Congratulations to Shannon Reynolds and Jaime Roberts for eventually getting to Tokyo to fulfil their well-deserved dreams. They are both fantastic ambassadors for WA paddling and great female role models in a sport that is fortunate to give opportunities across both sexes. It also shows the pointy end of the pathway that has been well-tended by Ramon Andersson over many years. I think both will acknowledge their gratitude to him and all the WAIS support staff.

I would also like to thank Karl Cooke at WAIS for his support of the Paddling High-Performance program. Unfortunately, Karl has returned home to the UK, and we wish him well as we await his replacement. Likewise, Jesse Phillips has done a plethora of work in the junior development pathway space in the difficult time when COVID has curtailed overseas representation. Also, a mention to the PA Junior Coach of the Year, Andrew Crothers, a great acknowledgment of his dedication.

The WASP'S sprint and slalom squads continue. In addition, the WAIS sponsored TID squad selection continued with Bayswater and Champion Lakes hosting last season's programs and Ascot to host

the upcoming season.

PWA is in a sound financial position and is one of the leading states on the balance sheet across all areas. We have great experience in the office staff at present, with the ability to cover each other's portfolios if required. I look forward to working with Rosalie, our amazing Executive Officer, her staff and a stable and diverse Board to supporting and building on the gains we have made over the last few years.

OUR EVENTS

Classic Paddle

186 participants

Congratulations to the 109 craft and 186 participants who braved the chilly conditions on the morning at our annual LiveLighter Classic Paddle! This was the biggest number we have had for many years, and we're amazed to see other craft compete such as SUPs, Dragon Boats, Outriggers and even Surf Boats! The 2020 Royal Life Saving Society WA Dash was fought out hard, especially in the mens. This annual event is loved by all paddlers whether they are PWA members or not, starting at Deep Water Point in Mount Pleasant and finishing at Gilbert Fraser Reserve in North Fremantle. At the end of the race, the participants are given a healthy lunch and a drink which is provided by the North Fremantle Cricket Club which is a good fund-raiser for their Club and included in the entry fee.

Paddle Challenge

153 participants

The LiveLighter Paddle Challenge was once again a great success, with a record number of participants racing across the 4 different courses. Ever since last years' LiveLighter Paddle Challenge, which was held right after WA's first lockdown, our paddling events have had a huge increase in registration numbers, with this year's event attracting 153 competitors. There has also been an increase in participation from our outriggering and SUP communities, who are now becoming regular faces around the other paddling events. It was a fantastic event that was unaffected by weather, and we must thank Bayswater Paddlesports Club for cooking up a BBQ for paddlers after the race.

The Ramon

110 participants

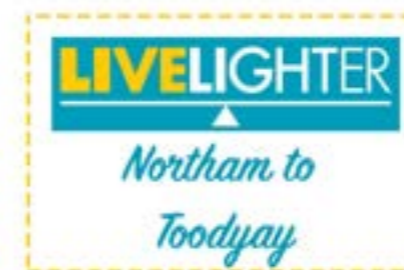
Now in its second year, the 2021 LiveLighter The Ramon attracted well over 100 competitors on the same weekend as the Avon Descent, which is a fantastic number to have in the race. Held along the final 15km of the Avon Descent, 34 paddlers competed in outriggers, 12 raced on SUPs, 15 guppies raced in a team, and 47 in single or double kayaks. Everyone made the most of the fast-flowing Swan River which made for very fast race times, with all paddlers successfully finishing the race before competitors in the Avon Descent. New medals were minted for this event in honour of Ramon Andersson, which feature an engraved image of Ramon on the 1994 Olympic podium with his bronze medal.

Northam to Toodyay

143 participants

The 2021 LiveLighter Northam to Toodyay race was the biggest one to date, with 143 competitors registered for the event! With river levels of ~1.5m, there was a very fast current that made for quick race times. Many rapids were washed out at this level which made paddling them somewhat easier, but still made features like Glen Avon Rapid tricky to navigate. All in all, the event couldn't have had better conditions and every single paddler managed to finish the race without any incidents, apart from some minor boat damage.

A special thank you goes to Jane Liddle, Peter Liddle, Michael Liddle, Warren Southwell, Nathan Jamieson and Rowie from PDRC who removed the Northam Weir sign which had been bent upstream and created a significant hazard.



Sea Kayak Fest 2021

The 2021 WA Sea Kayak Fest was held in Albany over the Labour Day long weekend (March 2021) with over 70 paddlers attending. The event opened on Friday evening with a presentation on paddling the islands of Queensland by Les Allen, registrations for Saturday paddles and catching up with new and old friends.

Saturday brought south easterly winds which picked up 1 m sea in King George Sound. The swell forecast was 2 m from the South so most of King George Sound was protected by Bald Head. Three paddles were arranged for different skill levels (Beginners, intro to Sea Skills, Sea Skills) and many paddlers were challenged by the conditions. After hot showers and some lunch there were some workshops on ropework and rolling and a great talk by Andrew Munyard and Chris Fry on their recent Bass Strait crossing. The evening provided a complimentary meal of gourmet burgers followed by a fantastic talk on Western Australian raptors by Pete Burgess.

Sunday brought stronger winds and higher seas. A group headed up the Kalgan river where it was protected from the wind with everyone on the lookout for some local raptors on what is a very scenic paddle. Another group did a skills session including towing and rescues. More advanced paddlers headed out to Bald Head for a bit of extra bounce. The afternoon and evening included another workshop; Efficient Forward Paddling by Jenni Harrison, a reverse auction where many people picked up bargains and judging of the photo competition. Monday brought even stronger winds and conditions were not suitable for paddling.

The Sea Kayak Fest was a great event made great by all the people that attended, the Sea Leaders and the organising committee. It was a very social event with people from Sea Kayak Club WA, Swan Canoe Club, Ascot Kayak Club, UWA Outdoors and more. The Sea Kayak Fest is organised by Sea Kayak Club WA and Paddle WA. The 2022 Sea Kayak Fest will be held in Busselton.

Paddle Academy

Paddle WA is currently working with over 18 schools and several government organisations, the number of schools equates to over 865 students, with the schools, we offer both flatwater and whitewater sessions. The idea for Paddle Academy is to introduce upper school-aged children to paddling in a fun and friendly space, at the same time educating them in safety and water awareness. A deep focus has been on developing this area within the Paddle WA office team, as we can see what is achieved when the young people are exposed to an exciting outdoor adventure such as paddling, it is so good for their confidence and mental well-being.

JAVA

Andrew Crothers continues to remotely coach paddle athletes in East Java in preparation for the PON games, which will be held in October this year in Papua. With Andrew's great work in the international coaching scene and his great job with the TID Program, Andrew was named National Club Coach of the Year.

Masters Womens Program

Paddle WA ran a very successful Women of the Avon, this is a participation program for women of all abilities in paddling, that when confident and with support from other women they are introduced to whitewater. The Master's Women's program was run by Ramon Andersson and Jesse Phillips, this was a great initiative, as participate in the course and get great training and technique tips, the women had to sign up for the State Sprint Championships, for 95% of the women (24 in total) they had never competed in a sprint event. All the women had an amazing day and were so supportive of each other.

Women of the Avon

The LiveLighter Women of the Avon program was finally back after 2 years, and what an amazing group of ladies we had! This 3-week program is carefully structured for any women who have aspirations of the Avon Descent, or just want to start paddling competitively. This year we were extremely lucky to have Jane Liddle, Nina Mueller and Wendy Burdett as our star WOTA Instructors, and a special physiotherapy seminar from local paddler & physiotherapist Simone Wilson. Despite only having 3x face-to-face sessions in the program, all participants finished the course with a detailed training program that would lead them into the Avon Descent. Even after the course had finished, Jane Liddle continued to motivate the group and even organised whitewater river trips so that they could all feel comfortable before tackling the rapids!





Marathon Report

PWA Marathon were able to hold the normal schedule of seven marathons and two championship events during the 2020-2021 season.

Events were well attended. Numbers fluctuated and were, overall slightly down on previous years.

Marathon Events and Highlights

The season commenced, as always, with Island to Island which was held on a windy day. The event was a twin session between PWA Marathon and SUPWA. Both disciplines raced at the same time on mostly the same course with a successful outcome.

The second event was the Moore River Marathon combined with the Mixed Doubles State Championships. The river was a little low on race day and the upstream turn had to be located short of the normal turn-around island. There was some participation from Moore River locals which included an address at briefing time from one of them.

The next event was Mandurah Canals in December. It was held on a beautiful Mandurah day. Numbers were good. People enjoyed the race except for a collision incident which necessitated some post race 'discussion' with the parties involved.

Early January saw a return to Lake Leschenaultia for the State 10K Championships. The wind was not strong but it had sufficient effect on the water to impact intermediate and less competent paddlers. Again, there was an incident on the water, this time to do with overtaking.

The Canning River Race, in February, had to be postponed due to a storm that blew through Perth that weekend. It was held the following weekend and attracted good numbers and a good number of paddlers in the short course.

Next on the plan was the State Marathon Championships. A cyclonic weather feature came further south than normal during the week beforehand. The river level rose considerably and the extent of impact on water quality necessitated postponing the event to late March. It was held at Sandy Beach, was well attended and most paddlers enjoyed it. Medals were awarded on the day with the magnificent Swan River as a back-drop. Sandy Beach was declared a definitely acceptable venue.

A very rainy day in mid April saw the Marathon Discipline travel to Pinjarra for the Pinjarra to Ravenswood marathon. The event was well attended and notable for the addition of outrigger craft.

There were two more events in the season: Double Barkers and Upper Swan. The longer distances at the end of the season saw the addition of paddlers from other disciplines who were embarking on their Avon Descent training. There were also good numbers of outriggers in both events.

2020/2021 Sprint Season Events

Regattas were well attended by a wide range of athletes and craft including sprint kayaks, surf ski's, Outriggers and va'a. The structure of the Regattas is challenging and need to meet the requirements of high-performance (WAIS) and high-level athletes while accommodating sub-juniors (Guppies) and highly competitive master's athletes and novice paddlers.

The 2020/2021 sprint season was successful despite the Covid-19 pandemic with all scheduled WA events going ahead. It is pleasing to see good attendance figures at regattas based on growth and athlete retention providing a solid foundation for the sport in WA.

The State Championships ran over two-days and with 150+ entries and was the largest State Titles in Australia.

Interstate event attendance at Grand Prix 1 and 2 was not possible due to travel restriction. Despite postponements and a last-minute venue changes a large team of WA athletes attended the National Championships in Adelaide.

Committee

The STC achieved several major milestones in development of Sprint in WA. These have greatly benefitted all WA athletes. Achievements include:

- Continuing training and development of new volunteers across key roles for running regattas,
- Assisted WA athletes with attending National Champs in Adelaide,
- Arranged more K4 racing at regattas,
- Achieved our goal of more than 150 entries to State Championships and WA can boast having the largest State Championships in Australia by entries,
- Improvements to regatta entry and seeding systems,
- Ongoing consultations with PA, PWA and other States to improve the delivery of all Sprints activities in WA.

The sport of Canoe Sprint in WA benefits greatly from the combined efforts of the STC, PWA, the many willing volunteers and the various coaches. Sprint activity in the general paddling community has grown over the past three seasons and provides an excellent environment for the all athletes and a solid foundation supporting the elite and aspiring-elite athlete. Sprints and marathon work together well to coordinate events and provide activities for flatwater paddlers in both disciplines.

It is pleasing to see growth in STC members over the last year and more volunteers across key regatta roles.



Ocean Report

The 2020-2021 season was a season that battled with the effects of inconsistent wind through our summer series and with closed borders impacting our biggest race the West Coast Downwinder.

We had 10 summer series races scheduled including the West Coast Downwinder, but because of lack of wind and hot temperatures we could only hold 7. The turnout for these was great with between 40-80 paddlers per race, except that the West Coast Downwinder attracted over 130 competitors.

This year we also introduced a new race, "The Oceanbuilt Gage Roads" event, which started at North Mole, Fremantle, out around the marker marking the Gage Roads and then downwind to Sorrento Beach, 27kms. For this race we introduced perpetual trophies 'The Ash Trophy' for Opens and the "U23 Gareth Wright Trophy" for both male and female.

The summer also saw a fantastic weekend in Mandurah with Ocean Skis being invited to race the King of the Cut for the first time and followed the next day by the Mandurah Duel. It was a great weekend attended by many from Perth.

The City of Perth Sunset Series in November 2020 was, as usual, well attended by both Ocean Paddlers and Surf Lifesaving ski paddlers. It's great to see the 2 get together in an event like this.

The end of the summer saw the Drummer's Run Handicap race, Port Beach to City Beach. Handicaps were calculated from submitted Garmin times for the 3-4 months preceding this, over the 11kms course.

We finished the year with 3 winter series races and invited juniors from surf clubs to attend. This was well supported with 10 junior females and 15 junior males racing with a choice of a short course or a long course.

We look forward to another great summer this coming season with the wind here in Perth.

Development

The WildWater WA Committee remains focused on growing the discipline and its brand within WA, which saw several positive changes introduced throughout the 2021 season. While there is a strong focus behind the scenes in planning and organization to deliver benefits to our competitors over upcoming seasons, the structure and format of the races this season remained a key focal point. The flexibility and communication provided to competitors around the sched-

uled races ensured quality races were delivered despite the external influences of COVID lockdowns and sustained river flooding and safety concerns.

With the addition of the now formalized Summer Series, and a continued focus to include additional Sprint format races throughout the season, the outlook for our discipline and the further technical development of our future athletes and state representatives is positive.

Much the same as our 2020 season, WildWater WA were without a doubt challenged in their ability to facilitate the scheduled races in 2021 due to COVID lockdowns in both the Summer Series and WildWater Championship season. In addition, the sustained "minor flood" river levels seen in the latter half of the season required frequent updates and changes to be communicated across several races, but nonetheless enabled all of our Championship races to proceed.

Our Championship Series was well supported again this year with a total of 78 unique competitors comprised of 54 WildWater and 24 Sundries paddlers. Although slightly down on last year's numbers, these figures do not include the additional 91 competitors who took part in the WildWater WA run Avon Seeding Race #3.

Personally, I would like to thank the Volunteer Personnel and the committee (listed above) for ensuring that our series could operate both efficiently and safely, with special mentions to Beck FLORISSON, Bruce MCWHIRTER, Warren SOUTHWELL and Timothy EDWARDS who went above and beyond this year. With many pathway and development programs on the agenda, WildWater in WA is poised to go from strength to strength over the coming seasons.

The financial statements cover Paddle WA as an individual entity. Paddle WA is a not-for-profit association incorporated in Western Australia under the Associations Incorporation Act 2015 (WA) ('the Act').

The principal activity of the association for the year ended 30 June 2021 is:

To introduce and promote paddling in Western Australia through participation in the activity of paddling for health, enjoyment, friendship, challenge and achievement.

Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

1 Basis of preparation

In the opinion of the Board of Management, the association is not a reporting entity since there are unlikely to exist users of the financial statements who are not able to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy specifically all of their information needs. These special purpose financial statements have been prepared to meet the reporting requirements of the Act.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards and Accounting Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements, AASB 107 Statement of Cash Flows, AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors and AASB 1054 Australian Additional Disclosures.

Significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and are consistent with prior reporting periods unless otherwise stated.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

2 Summary of significant accounting policies

Income tax

The association is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

Revenue and other income

Revenue is recognised when the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably, it is probable that economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the Association and specific criteria relating to the type of revenue as noted below, has been satisfied.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and is presented net of returns, discounts and rebates.

Sale of goods

Revenue is recognised on transfer of goods to the customer as this is deemed to be the point in time when risks and rewards are transferred and there is no longer any ownership or effective control over the goods.

Interest revenue

Interest is recognised using the effective interest method.

Dividend revenue

Dividends are recognised when the association's right to receive payment is established.

Dividends received from associates and joint venture entities are accounted for in accordance with the equity method of accounting.

Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of GST.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

Property, plant and equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment.

At the end of each annual reporting period, the depreciation method, useful life and residual value of each asset is reviewed. Any revisions are accounted for prospectively as a change in estimate.

Employee benefits

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be wholly settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Employee benefits expected to be settled more than one year after the end of the reporting period have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits. In determining the liability, consideration is given to employee wage increases and the probability that the employee may satisfy vesting requirements. Cash flows are discounted using market yields on high quality corporate bond rates incorporating bonds rated AAA or AA by credit agencies, with terms to maturity that match the expected timing of cash flows. Changes in the measurement of the liability are recognised in profit or loss.

Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost of inventory is determined using the first-in-first-out basis and is net of any rebates and discounts received. Net realisable value is estimated using the most reliable evidence available at the reporting date and inventory is written down through an obsolescence provision if necessary.

Impairment of non-financial assets

At the end of each reporting period, the association determines whether there is an evidence of an impairment indicator for non-financial assets.

Where this indicator exists and regardless for goodwill, indefinite life intangible assets and intangible assets not yet available for use, the recoverable amount of the assets is estimated.

Where assets do not operate independently of other assets, the recoverable amount of the relevant cash-generating unit (CGU) is estimated.

The recoverable amount of an asset or CGU is the higher of the fair value less costs of disposal and the value in use. Value in use is the present value of the future cash flows expected to be derived from an asset or cash-generating unit.

Where the recoverable amount is less than the carrying amount, an impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss.

Reversal indicators are considered in subsequent periods for all assets which have suffered an impairment loss, except for goodwill.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.


